In the first pages of the newsletter, you


will find updates that are relevant throughout the province. In the final pages of the newsletter, you will find information that is specific to each district.

Western District Synod

The 2024 Synod of the Western District of the Moravian Church Northern Province was held April 25-28 at Mt. Morris Camp & Retreat Center in Wautoma, Wisconsin. The theme for this gathering was "Survive, Revive, Thrive" and program was led by the Rev. Dr. C. Riddick Weber. Those gathered joined together in fellowship and worship, passed several proposals, elected new members of many district and interprovincial boards, and elected new district leadership for the coming four years. The Rev. Jason Andersen was elected as the president of the Western District Executive Board (WDEB). As president of the WDEB, Jason will serve as a member of the Northern Province Provincial Elders' Conference (PEC). The MCNP Racial Justice Team has prepared a timely five-week Bible Study on Christian Citizenship drawing on the Moravian Covenant for Christian Living and related scriptural texts. **"Being a Christian Citizen: A Bible Study for Our Time,"** is available to download for use in congregations at www.Moravian.org/Northern/RacialJustice. In addition, the Racial Justice Team will offer the Bible Study on Zoom on Tuesdays, May 28, and June 4, 11, 18, and 25, 2024, from 7:30 pm to 8:30 pm ET. Most of the hour will be spent in small groups discussing questions provided in the Bible Study. Session titles include: *Humility as a Christian Citizen; We Are Citizens of a Country, What Does That Mean*?; and *Civil Authority and Responsibility: Obligations and Opportunities.* The online Zoom Bible Study sessions are open to all. Engage your congregation in mission!

The Board of World Mission offers a variety of resources for local congregations to assist them in fulfilling their mission goals. These resources are designed to help congregations engage in meaningful mission work in their communities and beyond. These resources include a Mission Discernment Guide, a Mission Team training module, and sermon suggestions.

The Mission Discernment Guide is a multi-session guide that can help congregations discern their mission focus and develop a plan to achieve their goals. The Mission Team Training materials are for congregations forming teams to do mission work locally or globally. These materials cover cross-cultural sensitivity, team building, and spiritual formation. The BWM staff is available to help congregations utilize these materials.

The preaching guide is written by Bishop Chris Giesler and gives pastors, Bible study leaders, or Sunday school teachers suggestions and ideas for preaching or teaching with a missional focus. The text used each week is generally the Gospel lesson assigned in the 3-year lectionary.

May 5th: Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Awareness Day

Sunday, May 5 has been designated as "Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Awareness Day" by both the US and Canada. The 2023 Synod of the MCNP called the church to recognize this day and to consider ways, in consultation with those impacted, to act to support Indigenous individuals, families, and communities. (Church and Society, Third Partial Report, Resolve 11.) The following statistics were included in the legislation passed by the 2023 MCNP Synod:

- Native American women on reservations face murder and sexual assault rates more than ten times higher than the national average (U.S. Department of Justice)
- Homicide is the third-leading cause of death for American Indian and Alaska Native women 10 to 24 years of age, and the fifth-leading cause of death for American Indian and Alaska Native women between 24 and 34 years of age (Center for Disease Control and Prevention)
- In 2016, though there were 5,712 reports of missing American Indian and Alaska Native women and girls, the federal missing person database only logged 116 cases (NCIC.)
- In Canada, Indigenous women and girls are at least six times more likely to be murdered than other women and girls. (Amnesty International)

The symbol used to indicate solidarity with missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls is a red handprint usually painted across the face, to symbolize voices that go unheard and that have been silenced by violence. One step that can be taken is to encourage members of your congregation to wear red on Sunday, May 5, and to invite those who do to post a photo of themselves on social media using #MMIW or #NoMoreStolenSisters! It is our desire that we may learn from one another and rejoice together in the riches of the love of Christ and the manifold wisdom of God. The Moravian Church Northern Province considers it a sacred privilege to journey with and learn from other denominations, particularly those with whom we enjoy a full communion relationship. As Ecumenical Officer, I represent the province or the Moravian Church in America at gatherings of our full communion partners. I also serve on the Coordinating Council of Churches Uniting in Christ (CUIC), one of the conciliar groups with whom we bear witness to our unity in Christ. *(continued on following page...)*

In April, the Church Council (equivalent to our PEC) of the ELCA met in Chicago. Among other matters, they received "Faithful Teaching," the Common Statement of the Twelfth Round of the U.S. Lutheran-Catholic Dialogue. This is the culmination of 60 years of dialogue that began before Vatican II was finalized. It calls on Lutherans and Catholics to honor their own tradition and that of the other – in a shared mission to proclaim the Good News, teach the faith, and focus on what binds people together. There is implied within it a commitment not to disparage how the other understands and teaches the faith. It was emphasized that when a body 'receives' such a document, members pledge to live into the commitments that are part of the dialogue reports. This body also reviewed social statements on gun-related violence and trauma, and civic life and faith.

On April 30, the Rev. Dr. Neil Routh, president of the PEC, Southern Province and I took part in a Full Communion Celebration Liturgy held at the General Conference of the United Methodist Church in Charlotte, NC. This liturgy celebrated the full communion relationship that both of our provinces approved in 2018. The United Methodist Conference, scheduled to be held in 2020, was delayed until now due to Covid. I invite your prayers for this ongoing gathering, during which delegates will vote on the identity and character of the United Methodist Church as they weather significant division in their denomination over matters of human sexuality.

In the warm embrace of the Lord, The Rt. Rev. C. Hopeton Clennon, known affectionately to all as Hopeton, was called to his heavenly home on Sunday, January 7, 2024, surrounded by his loving family. Hopeton was born on March 25, 1960, in Kingston, Jamaica. He was the son of Enos Leopold Clennon and Iris May Jones Clennon. He was united in marriage to Sheila Monica Johnson, on July 23, 1988, at Trinity Moravian Church, Kingston, Jamaica. He attended the University of West Indies & United Theological College of West Indies, graduating in 1982 with a diploma in Ministerial Studies and in 1991 received an M.A. in Theology. He was ordained on June 19,1983 and served as pastor in Jamaica until moving to the United States in 1989. In the United States he served Faith Moravian Church, Washington, DC; Schoeneck Moravian Church, Nazareth, PA; Moravian Church of Downey near Los Angeles, CA; as chaplain of the Moravian University and Moravian Theological Seminary and served as the senior pastor of Central Moravian Church in Bethlehem, PA. Additionally, Br. Hopeton has been the driving force for the renovations in Camp Hope, Jamaica. On October 25, 1998, he was consecrated as the 320th bishop of the Worldwide Moravian Unity. Hopeton is preceded in death by his parents Enos Leopold and Iris May and his sisters Andrea Mae Clennon and Denese Clennon. He is survived by his loving wife of 35 years, Sheila Clennon; children Andrew Clennon of Bethlehem, PA; Danielle Landis and husband Jared of Limerick, PA; Hope-Elizabeth Clennon-Hibbert and her husband Randy of New Jersey; grandchildren Nathaniel & Grace and sisters Evett Joy Barnett of Los Angeles, CA and Bethinia' (Betty) Edwards of Jamaica. The Rev. Sandra Thigpen was called home on Monday, January 15, 2024, after a brief illness at the Magnolia Creek Assisted Living in Winston Salem. Sr. Sandra was born on January 12, 1945, in Louisville, KY. She graduated in 1991 from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and was ordained a Deacon on August 19, 1992. She was the first female Chaplain to serve in an adult male correction facility in North Carolina. Reverend Thigpen served as an Associate Chaplain at Forsyth Jail and Prison Ministries for 7 years, was the Assistant Senior Chaplain for 3 years, and Chaplain at the NC Baptist Hospital while completing studies in Clinical Pastoral Education. In 1997, she was awarded the National Woman of Achievement Award for Religion and was the keynote speaker for the International Moravian Women's Conference. In September 2000, Reverend Thigpen was the Millennium Speaker for the Virgin Islands Moravian Women's Fellowship Conference. She became the first African-American woman to the Pastorate in the Moravian Church in America; she served as Pastor to St. Phillips Moravian Church, the oldest African-American Church in Winston Salem for 3 years, an Adjunct Professor at Wake Forest Divinity School, and Pastor of Grace Moravian Church in Queens, NY. She was preceded in death by her parents, Christina (mother); John Alvis Sr, (father); two brothers; one sister; and her only son, Brian Christopher Thigpen, on May 1, 2023. Sr. Sandra is survived by her daughter, Tosha Davis; 5 grandchildren: Cristina Thigpen, Cassandra Thigpen, Sierra Davis, Sabian Thomas, and Dante Thomas; 7 great grandchildren: Kendrick, Chandler, Chloe', Claire, Kalaya, Easton, and Christian; a sister, Inez Grevious (Rev. Robert Grevious); a brother Reginald Alvis; and a host of nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends. A memorial celebrating her life was held on Saturday, February 3, 2024 at Calvary Moravian Church, Winston-Salem. 

Welcome, Incoming Western District Executive Board!

Delegates at the 2024 Western District Synod elected new leadership for the coming four years. The Rev. Jason Andersen, currently pastor of Christian Faith Moravian Church in DeForest, Wisconsin, was elected as the president of the Western District Executive Board (WDEB). Outgoing president the Rev. Bruce Nelson, who has held the role since 2016, will conclude his term in June. Other members of the WDEB elected at synod include Rev. Marian Boyle Rohloff, pastor of West Side Moravian Church; Rev. Kerry Krauss, pastor of Sister Bay Moravian Church; Steve Heroux from Watertown Moravian Church; Ivy Summers from West Side Moravian Church; Linda Schaefer from Sister Bay Moravian Church; and JoAnn Keller from Hope Moravian Church.

The incoming WDEB was installed in a service on Sunday, April 28. Moravian bishops the Rt. Rev. Paul Graf, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Kay Ward and the Rt. Rev. Dr. Amy Gohdes–Luhman led the service, blessing the newly–elected board and charging Synod delegates to support and pray for the WDEB. The WDEB acts as the executive board of the Western District during the intersynodal period. Its primary roles are to oversee the boards and institutions of the Western District, supervise pastoral changes, manage district funding, advise congregations and extend the work of the Church within the district. The newly elected board will serve through the synod of 2028.
