Greetings from the Southern Province Following 2024 Intersynodal Conference Rev. Dr. Neil Routh

Our siblings in the Southern Province recently gathered for an intersynodal conference – a time between provincial synods to gather clergy and lay leaders to reflect on and recommit to the ministry they are doing together. Below is a reflection from the Rev. Dr. Neil Routh, President of the Southern Province Provincial Elders' Conference. We include this article as an opportunity to be informed about the work of the Moravian Church throughout North America and we invite your prayers for our Southern Province siblings as they reflect on the time they spent together and discern how it might impact their ministry moving forward.

More than 160 lay representatives and church professionals from across the Southern Province gathered for the 2024 Intersynodal Conference at New Philadelphia Moravian Church – Oct 25 and 26. The Rev. Dr. Phil Maynard shared the themes from his book: "SHIFT 2.0 – Helping Congregations Back in the Game of Effective Ministry."

Dr. Maynard noted the significance of Christian discipleship as "belonging, becoming, and believing." How intentional congregational ministry should focus on members learning first to belong to one another. Then, through shared study and ministry efforts, to catch the desire of what it means to become more like Jesus. And finally, to be more intentional to put into action our core beliefs rooted in sharing the unconditional love of Jesus with neighbors and the broader community.

I first discovered Maynard's "SHIFT" principles while serving as pastor at Grace Moravian Church (Mount Airy, NC) 2016–2022. The specific shift from membership to discipleship became a chief principle of the ministry goals of the congregation in the three years before the Covid19 pandemic. Because of this focus, ministry flourished despite the challenge of COVID — especially our outreach to the community.

This conference offered SHIFT as one way for congregations more intentionally the role of discipleship training in congregational ministry. The conference also provided a forum for the testimony and insights of collaborative ministry efforts happening across the Southern Province.

Gratitude is expressed to New Philadelphia staff and volunteers for hosting, the provincial staff for organizing this event — especially Beverly Johnson, the Rev. Rebecca Craver, and The Rt. Rev. Lane Sapp. But most importantly for the presence of God's Spirit through many participants, workshop leaders, and presenters.

Celebration of UNESCO World Heritage Site Inscription

Guests from around the world gathered in Bethlehem October 16–17, 2024, to celebrate the inscription of the Moravian Church Settlements UNESCO World Heritage Site – the first ever transnational UNESCO site – which includes the settlements of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania; Gracehill, Northern Ireland; Christiansfeld, Denmark; and Herrnhut, Germany.

Festivities began on Wednesday evening with a beautiful worship service at Central Moravian Church, which highlighted the connectedness of our global Unity. It was a blessing to hear



from each of the Moravian areas represented in the UNESCO inscription. As church leaders and dignitaries joined together to recognize the rich history of our Moravian Church, this joyous service also celebrated our identity as a living, serving church that is ministering in diverse contexts throughout the world today.

On Thursday, guests began the day by touring some of the most historic buildings in Bethlehem. Led by Historic Bethlehem Museum & Sites, guests were invited to step into the past and learn about how early Bethlehem Moravians expressed their faith through worship, mission service, and daily activities. The official inscription ceremony took place on Thursday afternoon in Foy Concert Hall on the South Campus of Moravian University. Representatives of UNESCO, as well as spokespeople from each of the Moravian Settlements represented in this inscription spoke of the Moravian Church's contributions to the communities of which they are a part and

the importance of preserving and sharing the history of these settlements.

Moravian Disaster Response to Hurricane Helene

was flooded and needs a complete rebuild. Rev. Chris Thore is heading up work on this project and is especially in need of folks with carpentry, cabinetry, plumbing, and electrical skills. We are also interested in congregations or groups willing to come as mission teams either in the clean-up effort at Laurel Ridge or in the home of one of their neighbors.

As we approach the Advent season, we are excited to share a special resource — a four-week liturgy for use in lighting the Advent wreath candles. This resource was created as a collaboration between the Board of World Mission, the Moravian Ministries Foundation, and the Southern Province Commission on Congregational Development (with many thanks to the Interprovincial Board of Communications for their assistance in promoting it!). This partnership between Moravian agencies reflects our shared commitment to supporting and strengthening the Moravian Church through collective action, showing that we are stronger when we serve and worship together.

The Advent Candle Lighting Liturgies for 2024 provides a short liturgical guide through the themes of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love, connecting these Advent themes with the real-life ministries of Moravian congregations and organizations. Each week's liturgy is rooted in Moravian tradition, offering powerful examples of the Church's work across the world. These liturgies also create space for your congregation to highlight the ways you are bringing these themes to life through your own ministries and outreach.

This resource is available in both English and Spanish, and we are providing not only a Word document version but also PowerPoint slides to be used or adapted for projection during worship services. We hope this flexibility will make the resource accessible and engaging for all who wish to utilize it.



Through these liturgies, we are invited to remember that Jesus is the Light of the World, and we, as His followers, are called to reflect that light in our communities. We pray this resource will enrich your Advent worship, bringing together your congregation to celebrate and share the hope, peace, joy, and love that comes through Christ's coming into the world.

Congregation Closure: Mountainview Moravian Church

After more than seven decades of faithful and inspirational service to Christ, it is with both regret and appreciation that we announce that **Mountainview Moravian Church** in Hellertown, PA will bring its ministry to a close on November 24, 2024.

In the late 1940s a group of students from nearby Moravian Theological Seminary in Bethlehem, PA, needed a senior project. At that time construction was underway on the new Hellertown subdivision of Mountainview. Seeing a need for a Sunday School, the students organized one. The Sunday School first met in a tent and later in a house just around the corner from the present church building. The congregation was formally chartered on March 14, 1951. Throughout its history the congregation has been notable for its strong sense of fellowship, openness to newcomers, and commitment to growing Christian disciples one person at a time.



Sister Jodie Harney, who has been serving as their dedicated pastor, speaks fondly of their love for making sugar cakes and how this has been a generational affair. As well, she helped lead a spirit of hospitality which welcomed community organizations into their facility, including the Girl and Boy Scouts, programs from the YMCA, Zumba classes, yoga classes, and space for AA groups. Since August of 2013, Mountainview has had a thriving Clothing Ministry providing free clothing to anyone who comes during the distribution days as well as to individuals with emergency needs. To date, over 80,000 items have been distributed.

When asked to share their memories of the church, several members have reflected on the youth program / fellowship group that involved not only members of the church but the friends that they brought along. Another memory that was shared by many was the church and community dinners that were held for years and the amazing sense of fellowship that was felt by all in attendance.

Thus, in 2024, Mountainview will be celebrating 74 years of community-based ministry. They have lived as a community of Christians, sharing God's love and grace through words and actions. Please hold the community in prayer as they bring closure to this ministry, yet also celebrate the amazing and wonderful ways they have touched countless lives in tangible ways.



Tribal Elder of the Delaware Nation (Lenape) Visits Bethlehem Saturday, November 2nd, 1:30pm — Central Moravian Church Old Chapel

Join us for a talk by Lenape retired tribal elder and member of the Delaware tribe of Oklahoma, John Thomas. For thousands upon thousands of years, the Lenape people lived in this region, until being driven off this land by European settlers, and forced removals from the 18th and early 19th centuries. The 18th century Moravian church was engaged in mission work with the local Lenape people; working, worshipping (and being buried) alongside them in the 18th century. There are ancestral memories of the Moravian Church and their mission work,

along with the accompaniment with the forced removals. John Thomas is not only an amazing speaker, but also a well-known advocate of Native American rights and has worked extensively in providing proper reburial for Native American bones and funerary objects which stolen from ancestral graves in the last centuries. Following John's talk, there will be the option to join us at God's Acre for a tour of several Native American graves. We hope that this conversation can continue into the new year as we continue as Moravians to seek the venues to listen and acknowledge the experiences of indigenous peoples.

We have also had the opportunity have myself and, in some instances, one or more other District Board members visit and have conversations with Joint Boards of our congregations in Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, and California that do not have another Moravian sibling congregation closeby. The District Board is most grateful for these opportunities for ministry conversation and welcome the enthusiasm, creativity, and faithfulness of our congregational leadership.
