Good News

Today's Gospel seems strange. At the beginning, John the Baptist calls those who have come to hear him preach "a brood of vipers!" (Luke 3:7). At the end, we are told, "So . . . he proclaimed the *good news* to the people" (Luke 3:18).

I have a friend, a social worker, who is struggling with how he and his wife raise their children. So much of what he hears and reads about Christian faith feels like John the Baptist. It tells us how we are bad, what is wrong with us. My friend says it is really different from what he thinks or says as a social worker. He is wondering whether he can be a Christian, because Christian faith does not feel like Good News.

Perhaps the answer is in the middle of the Gospel, where John says someone greater is coming, someone who will baptize with fire and Holy Spirit, not water, namely, Jesus.

John the Baptist and Jesus have a similar expectation that their listeners can bear fruit, through God's working to change their hearts and lives. But Jesus, John tells us, will baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire—both of which are harder for us to control. Jesus will spend more time with people on the margins: those who are sick, those who are poor, women, those who are finding it hard to meet neighbors' expectations, persons considered "sinners." This Jesus will be God among us, Emmanuel (Matthew 1:23). The Spirit is the promise that the God we meet in Jesus continues to help us to live well.

That God is among us is an unusual and frightening promise. It is also Good News.

Lighting of the Third Advent Candle

JOY through Environmental Stewardship

On this third Sunday of Advent, as we anticipate the coming Christ Child, we light the candle of joy.

We rejoice that in Jesus Christ, God is with us, Immanuel.

(Three candles are lit.)

When Christ comes into our lives,

He brings the fullness of joy.

In Luke's Gospel, we read that when Jesus was born, the angels said his coming was good news and great joy for all people.

Because Christ has come to us, we can live every day in the joy of the Lord.

Climate change has brought repeated flooding to areas of Central America, including areas where our Moravian siblings in Nicaragua and Honduras reside. These floods have destroyed the important crops of beans and rice. While this has brought great hardship to them, they have found great joy in shipments of seeds, medicines, and food provided through the Board of World Mission.

We thank God for those who care for the environment.

In North Carolina, the Clemmons and Macedonia Moravian congregations are tending native pollinator gardens to boost bee populations.

We thank God for those who care for the environment.

The Ephraim Moravian Congregation in Wisconsin and the Union Cross Congregation in North Carolina have installed solar panels to reduce their carbon footprint.

We thank God for those who care for the environment.

In this time, our congregation celebrates the light of Joy in our community and through our shared ministry:

ADVENT 2

(Standing)

Sing to the Lord a new song, for God has done marvelous things.

We will offer the sacrifice of thanksgiving and tell of God's deeds in songs of joy.

Awake, awake, you people of God, put on your festive garments.

For God has already clothed us with the garments of salvation and has covered us with the robe of righteousness.

The Holy One has delivered us and has become our salvation.



We give thanks to you, eternal God, for the Word in human form given to us in the child of Bethlehem.


The Word speaks to us in a way we cannot avoid:

Therefore, let us put aside the masks of pretended righteousness and confess our sins to God.

Gracious God, this Advent season stirs a longing to have Christ come alive within us, yet we allow ourselves to become enslaved to cynicism, selfishness, and greed. In a season for freely giving and receiving, we tend to live by debt and obligation. We rush from task to task, scarcely opening our eyes to the peace and beauty around us. We glory in the visions of the old man Zechariah in the temple, which were fulfilled in his wife, Elizabeth; but our ministry to the elderly in our midst falls short. We sing of One who was laid in a borrowed manger, but we ignore the poor and homeless among us. We decry the violence of a wicked king, yet we are too often silent in the face of abuse and injustice around us. For these and all our sins, forgive us, we pray, gracious God.

Comfort, comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to them and proclaim that they have suffered long enough, that their penalty is paid, and their sins are forgiven.

The grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all. Christ Jesus gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity and purify a people of his own. Thanks be to God!


He does not judge by what his eyes see, nor decide by what his ears hear; but with righteousness he judges the poor and decides with equity for the meek of the earth.


We believe in the coming reign of God when justice will be established in the earth.

We are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that we might proclaim the mighty acts of him who called us out of darkness and into his marvelous light. May our lives show forth that which we truly are. We pray in the name of Jesus. Amen.

May the Holy Spirit strengthen us to become more like Christ as we eagerly await his coming.

Philippians 4:4-7 NRSVUE

⁴ Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵ Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. ⁶ Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

⁷ John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? ⁸ Therefore, bear fruits worthy of repentance, and do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor,' for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ⁹ Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; therefore, every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire."


¹⁰ And the crowds asked him, "What, then, should we do?" ¹¹ In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none, and whoever has food must do likewise." ¹² Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" ¹³ He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." ¹⁴ Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

¹⁵ As the people were filled with expectation and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶ John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water, but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the strap of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷ His winnowing fork is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

¹⁸ So with many other exhortations he proclaimed the good news to the people.


