Reflection on the Western District Clergy Retreat Rev. Jason Andersen, President of the Western District Executive Board

Pastors from around the Western District, both ordained and lay, currently serving a congregation and retired, Moravian and from other denominations, gathered for a time of fellowship, retreat, worship, and conversation at Mt. Morris Camp and Retreat Center just outside of Wautoma, WI, on January 13–16, where we could enjoy Mt. Morris' wonderful hospitality and delicious food.



This annual gathering is organized and coordinated by our

pastors. The current facilitator is Rev. Joel Russell, pastor of the Bethel and Goshen Moravian Churches in North Dakota. Our worship coordinator was Rev. Hermann Weinlick. The program this year was led by Rev. Rick Beck, a retired Moravian pastor who has served in all three districts of the Northern Province and who is a certified spiritual director. Brother Rick's program centered around the book "The Inner Work of Age: Shifting from Role to Soul" by Dr. Connie Zwieg and was entitled "Meaningful Aging." Program attendees had the opportunity to see that the focus wasn't about "getting old," but instead about the process of aging that happens to us all, regardless of our numerical age. Transitions occur throughout the life span and there are opportunities to examine and reexamine where we have grown emotionally, cognitively, and spiritually, whether we are 25, 55, or 85. Periodically, life circumstances bring us to a place of realization that concepts, ideals, and practices that worked for us before no longer work. Changes and adaptations are necessary. New paradigms are needed. The next stage of life and growth beckons.

Regardless of vocation, for us to be faithful and caring executors of our calling, it is necessary periodically to withdraw and retreat momentarily in order that we may evaluate and reevaluate the intention with which we are guiding our lives. It may be that after that period of evaluation, we conclude that we can continue the course on which we are travelling. Or we may come to see that changes are needed. In either case, we proceed confidently identifying the integrity with which we examined our lives, and grateful for the guiding hand of God to see us through all our days.

If you attend a Western District or Canadian District congregation, reach out to your pastor to ask them how their retreat experience was or, if they were unable to attend, what self-care steps they are taking to ensure they are observing this important work; the Canadian District Clergy Retreat was in September. If you attend an Eastern District congregation, encourage your pastors (ordained or lay, Moravian or ecumenical) to attend the upcoming retreat on March 31 – April 2 at Bon Secours Retreat Center in Marriotsville, MD.

Resources for Caring for Immigrant and Refugee Neighbors

In 2023, the Northern Province Synod affirmed "the worth, dignity, and inherent value and rights of immigrants, migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, and declare[d] its support for the humane treatment of any person coming across our borders, regardless of legal status." Other resolutions encouraged the development of educational materials for congregations to better understand the issues around immigration; and encouraged the PEC's advocacy for humane policies at our borders. The Synod reiterated earlier Synod's action by going "on record as supporting those who, acting out of their faith and witness, provide sanctuary and asylum to those fleeing from persecution in their home lands." The

MCNP Racial Justice Team is providing initial educational and practical resources to care for the immigrant and refugee neighbors in your communities. We encourage you to review the resources available at MCNP.org (click "Racial Justice and Healing" under the Ministries tab), including guidelines from the ELCA and Episcopal Church about becoming a sanctuary church, resources compiled by the Board of World Mission, and printable Red Cards to be distributed widely.

World Interfaith Harmony Week: February 1-7

Br. David Jones, President of the Board of Elders Canadian District, has joined his ecumenical colleagues in Canada in a statement issued on Interfaith Harmony. Rev. Susan Johnson, National Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and The Most Rev. Anne Germond, Archbishop and Acting Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada also signed the statement that reads, in part:

"From February 1 to 7, people all around the world mark World Interfaith Harmony Week. It's an initiative that arose from the United Nations in 2010, based on the desire to see people draw on the resources of spirituality, faith and religious traditions in support of the common good, rather than allowing those things to be co-opted to sow seeds or rivalry and violence, as they so often are. The year 2025 is the 15th anniversary of the launch of this global cause for justice and peace.

"We are grateful that, in these days of World Interfaith Harmony Week, members of our churches across Canada, together with many others around the world, are already planning to take part in multifaith opportunities, with open and generous hearts. We encourage many more to find occasions for engagement

in your context. The struggles and sorrows of our world are too great for people of faith to respond to alone. In this time, when there are so many forces and factors at work that want to drive people into greater distance and distrust because they think and look and believe and pray differently from one another, World Interfaith Harmony Week is a witness to another way – one that is so desperately needed." In 2017 William Willimon, retired bishop in The United Methodist Church, and former dean of the Chapel at Duke University, wrote a short and accessible book entitled, "Who Lynched Willie Earle?" It is a book about a South Carolina pastor who in 1947 preached a sermon against the mob lynching of a black man called Willie Earle who was accused of killing a white taxi driver. The white preacher was called Hawley Lynn and he preached an anti-racism sermon about white privilege to his white congregation in a town that had just had a lynching, which most good Christians didn't want to talk about (though many church goers actively attended lynchings in their towns).

2025 Unity Prayer Day Offering: Common Moravian Theological Curriculum in Spanish

The Unity Prayer Day is normally held on the first Sunday in March. That means in 2025, the Unity Prayer Day Offering could be collected on **Sunday, March 2nd**. Please make a special effort to support this work!

Since our earliest days, the Unitas Fratrum has placed an emphasis on education, both vocational and theological. Today, there are Moravian seminaries and theological training centers across the world. These institutions are central to our ministry as a Church because they train the leaders of our Unity and give them the knowledge needed to serve our Chief Elder in their respective cultural and



political contexts. Through this Unity Prayer Day Offering, the Board of World Mission (BWM) will work with the Unity Committee on Theology (UCOT) and Moravian leaders and educators worldwide to produce a common theological training curriculum that can be adapted and used throughout the Unity and starting specifically with our Spanish speaking partners. This curriculum will include training in the Bible and Biblical Languages, Theology and Church History, and Pastoral Theology.






Moravian Seminary's Crossroads Lay Leadership Program Faith Journeys of the Old Testament



New Direction in Faith Formation for the Eastern District

The Eastern District will soon embark on a new venture to address leadership and support for congregational faith formation.

The Eastern District Executive Board approved a proposal from our current Director of Christian Education, Marie Couts, outlining a program where the District will be divided into four areas and each area will be served by a Director of Faith Formation.

Each of the four areas will be served part-time by individuals hired and trained for the positions. The training of hired individuals will include a two-phase process and upon completion of phase two, the title of the position will change to "Accredited Director of Faith Formation." Additionally, a Resource Director (Jami Vandock, a certified Church Educator in the Southern Province) has been hired part-time for resourcing and future training of the Area Directors. Her role will begin after individuals are hired and have completed phase one of the training.

While the positions will be accountable to the Eastern District Executive Board, the Eastern District Spiritual Formation Ministry Team will serve as the responsible agency for this newly created program. Plans call for implementation to begin July 2025.
