Provincewide Updates

2026 Synod of the Moravian Church Northern Province

The 2026 Synod of the Moravian Church Northern Province will be held in both a new format and a new location. This synod will take place over a period of two days June 25–26, 2026 (Thursday–Friday) with travel days on June 24 and 27, 2026 (Wednesday and Saturday). This new format for a synod comes in response to feedback received from previous synods and in anticipation of the possibility of a Joint Synod format between all three District Synods and a Special Provincial Synod in 2028.

The purpose of synod, as defined in the *Book of Order*, is "the highest judicatory in the Province with supreme legislative powers in all matters not committed to the Unity Synod…" (¶107). Even more, it is our responsibility to gather as leaders of the province to seek God's guidance as together we seek to be agents of God's transforming love in the world.

The official call to the 2026 Synod of the Moravian Church Northern Province was emailed to clergy, chairpersons of congregational boards, and ex oficio synod delegates of the Moravian Church Northern Province on March 11th. Please refer to that letter for more detailed information about synod, including ways you and your congregation should be preparing for this gathering. Additional location and scheduling details will follow in forthcoming communications.

The Rev. Jennika Eckhaus Borger Assumes New Roles at Moravian University School of Theology

Beginning July 1, 2025, the Rev. Jennika Eckhaus Borger will assume the role of Dean for Spirituality and Inclusion and Director of Moravian Church Relations for Moravian University. As the Dean for Spirituality and Inclusion, Jennika will be overseeing the Office of Spirituality and Inclusion and serving as Chaplain for Faculty and Staff. She will also be taking on the new role of Director of Moravian Church Relations for the School of Theology.



As Director of Moravian Church Relations, Jennika's focus will be on creating a bridge between Moravian Theological Seminary and the Moravian Church. She will focus on supporting our Moravian students and connecting with Church leadership to understand how the Seminary can best support the denomination. The Provincial Elders' Conferences of the Northern and Southern Provinces welcome this opportunity to strengthen our partnership with Moravian Theological Seminary and Lancaster Theological Seminary through this new staffing relationship. We look forward to Sister Jennika's presence at our various provincial and inter-provincial gatherings and the opportunity to be in closer conversation around the changing landscape of theological education and the ministries of our congregations.

Moravian Holy Week Readings / Activity for Families

Moravians have a wonderful tradition where congregations gather each evening between Palm Sunday and Easter to read and hear a harmony of the Gospels account of Jesus' last week on earth. While each congregation has its own tradition, central to all gatherings is the book entitled "Readings for Holy Week." However, for a variety of reasons, many families cannot join with their church family each night for the readings, so Marie Couts, Eastern District Director of Christian Education, developed an activity that families can use to share in the traditional "readings" in an abbreviated form. This "Holy Week" reading activity for families is designed to include our evening tradition in the home setting and is NOT intended to replace those important church reading services. The nightly home readings include condensed portions taken from the Holy Week Reading book and may be used each evening of Holy Week, or to supplement the evening(s) when families must miss the church gatherings. Participating together as a family in remembering the events of our Savior's last week on earth is an important ritual in the faith development of children. Even those too young to read can be participants in this home activity – by getting the table ready, by turning on the candles, and by listening to the transformative story.

Racial Justice Pilgrimage Grants – 2025

The Racial Justice Team is offering Pilgrimage Grants of \$500 to \$1,000 to encourage MCNP congregations to plan and experience pilgrimages toward racial justice and healing in 2025. Congregations may also apply for grant funds to join a pilgrimage sponsored by another

MCNP Racial Justice Team Announces Responding to God's Call for Mercy: A Bible Study on Immigration

The MCNP Racial Justice Team is announcing a new resource for congregations entitled, Responding to God's Call for Mercy: A Bible Study on Immigration. This Bible Study is commended to you by the Provincial Elders' Conference of the Moravian Church Northern Province, and the Racial Justice Team.

This five-session Bible Study on immigration includes relevant scriptural texts and interpretative reflections, statements from the

Moravian Covenant for Christian Living (MCCL), and applicable MCNP Synod resolutions. There are stories from immigrants and refugees for each session, along with tangible and practical information on immigration. This study provides a faithful overview of immigration challenges and blessings, suggestions for ways to care for immigrant and refugee neighbors, and resources for further study.

There is a Leader's Guide with additional information for each session. There is also an accompanying Journal that may be downloaded and copied for personal use.

Responding to God's Call for Mercy: A Bible Study on Immigration is provided by the Racial Justice Team (RJT) to help guide congregations in this time when many people are feeling anxious and fearful. It is part of the RIT's commitment to continue to provide resources for caring for immigrant and refugee neighbors in these difficult and uncertain times. In addition, the Racial Justice Team believes that the Church has an important perspective to add as our nations seek to develop a comprehensive solution to our immigration challenges – a solution that respects the diversity and worth of all people, while keeping our borders safe.


This April marks the 57th year since the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in Memphis, Tennessee. In March and April of that year Rev. King traveled to Memphis to speak and help with a strike by Black sanitation workers.

The grievances of workers included substandard pay, danaerous work conditions, and lack of any recourse to address concerns. The lack of care was most evident in the death of two workers in a garbage compacting truck in February, an event that kicked off the strike. Support for the strike was further organized by congregations and clergy, for God has something to say about oppression.

Pastoral Letter from the Bishops Serving the Northern and Southern Provinces

March 10, 2025

Dear Moravian Friends:

We, the bishops serving in the Northern and Southern Provinces, greet you with the grace, mercy, peace, and love of Jesus Christ, our Chief Elder. We send you this letter as we find ourselves in a divided world that needs God's love. In his first letter to the Corinthians, the Apostle Paul wrote these words to a church that was in the midst of deep conflict, "Now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love." (I Corinthians 13:13)

We realize divisions have found their way into our families, communities, and congregations. Into these difficult moments, we lift up the Moravian ideal of "In all things, love." This notion calls us to lean in with more determination to see that all of God's children feel the love of God and to advocate for those who have no voice when injustice is evident. We are alarmed by the current state of division and acrimony found in the United States and the bending of the Gospel message to support Christian nationalism.. We stand with our Moravian brothers and sisters and their countryfolk who seek asylum and legal status with our resources and advocacy and encourage all Moravians to do everything possible to assist their successful navigation through the path to citizenship.

The Board of World Mission has posted the following statement regarding cuts in USAID for our consideration:

The Board of World Mission is not a recipient of federal grants and would not be directly impacted on a budgetary level, but our ecumenical partner organizations who are key collaborators in disaster response and humanitarian work are being forced to scale back, furlough staff, and restructure their efforts in the face of uncertainty and, at least, temporary funding cuts. These changes will have a ripple effect on the communities they serve, and, if sustained, would also greatly impact the Board of World Mission's ability to partner with these organizations in relief efforts. BWM's global partners and Moravian communities could experience increased strain as food aid and community development programs are reduced or eliminated. We are committed to our partnerships and will do what we can to meet needs and sustain the vital work occurring within our partner areas, but we recognize that we cannot replace the full scope of what could be lost (February 15, 2025).

As Moravians, we affirm the essential that God creates, redeems, and blesses. We also affirm that our response is essential as well. We respond to God's gifts with Faith, knowing that the One who is in us, is greater than the one who is in the world (1 John 4:4). We respond with Love, knowing that our relationships must begin in love, continue in love, and hold deep respect for everyone no matter their ideas or beliefs (1 Corinthians 13:1–13). We respond with Hope by looking beyond the now to the kingdom that God has taught us about. A place where God's children are safe, lie down in peace, and believe this is our future (Isaiah 11:6).

It is our prayer that we can look upon each other and the world around us with the same compassion with which Jesus looked at a hungry crowd waiting to hear his sermon. Or the same compassion that filled the hearts of our Moravian forefathers and mothers as they left the comforts of home to share God's love with enslaved souls in a distant land. This witness is desperately needed today. May we, working together, provide it.

Ecumenical and Interreligious News *Rev. Dr. Betsy Miller, Northern Province Ecumenical Officer*

April 20, 2025 is a day of synchronicity in the religious calendar. On that day, Christians around the world – including Roman Catholic, Protestant, and Orthodox will celebrate Easter on the same day. While Protestant and Roman Catholic Churches follow the Gregorian calendar and always celebrate Easter on the same day, the Orthodox Church follows the Julian Calendar, where Easter usually falls on a different date. In some years the dates align, as they do this year. April 20 also marks the last day of the seven-day Jewish observation of Passover. Passover is the seven-day festival that recalls the Exodus story where God freed the Israelites from bondage in Egypt. It includes a Seder meal with symbolic foods and narratives that remind participants of God's saving intervention over the powers of Pharoah. This story is, of course, also part of our narrative of faith as we remember God's liberating power over unjust systems of oppression.

This coming together of dates gives us an opportunity to reflect on our relationships with siblings in faith – not just our Christian siblings, but also our siblings of the biblical witness. Together with our Jewish and Muslims companions, we are known as 'people of the Book,' all who claim the Bible as our primary text about God and faithfulness.

This common day of celebration calls us to remember that we all follow one Creator and that what we hold in common is always stronger than what separates us. This is an important reminder in a world that too often focuses on differences. How might you and your congregation take advantage of this shared common holy day and build a bridge toward your siblings of the book?

A Reminder for Holy Week from the Racial Justice Team

The Racial Justice Team is providing this reminder as we prepare to enter Holy Week in mid-April when many congregations will be using "Readings for Holy Week" and related scriptural texts.

In 2023, the Synod of the MCNP passed legislation entitled, "Antisemitism and Jewish-Christian Relations." The legislation, the Fifth Partial Report of the Church and Society Committee, noted that "…antisemitic incidents in the United States and Canada reached all-time highs in 2022 and 2021, respectively"; and that "there is a history of antisemitism in Christianity beginning about 150 CE with interpretations of the Gospel of John…and continuing through the centuries to the teaching and preaching of Protestant reformers that was later used to support the killing of millions of people during the Holocaust, and which persists today…"

The Synod recognized that, "Christian churches, including the Moravian Church Northern Province, may be inadvertently perpetuating antisemitism and contributing to its rise through our liturgies, hymns..., and worship resources, including scriptural references and other texts read without explanation of their context; the Moravian Book of Worship; "Readings for Holy Week;" and preaching and teaching in congregations..."

In light of this, two of the resolutions in the Synod Report encourage preachers, teachers, and other worship leaders to develop practices in the reading and interpretation of scripture that are less likely to lead to antisemitic

interpretations and contribute to "dismantling antisemitism and anti-Jewish theology." These two resolutions include some suggested practices and are copied below. Steven Thorngate's interview with Amy-Jill Levine in June 2023 in The Christian Century entitled, "What should churches do about the treatment of Jews in John," is one resource referenced in the resolutions. RESOLVED: (21) The 2023 Synod of the Moravian Church Northern Province encourages preachers, teachers, and other worship leaders of the Moravian Church Northern Province, when reading scripture in public which uses the word "Jews," to provide notes expressing how the text "had been and continues to be, used to malign Jews," and accompanying related prayers of repentance [FN7]; and/or use language that is less likely to lead to antisemitic interpretations; and be it further

RESOLVED: (22) The 2023 Synod of the Moravian Church Northern Province encourages preachers, teachers, and other worship leaders of the Moravian Church Northern Province to consider in interpretations of scripture what is written in the texts, what the texts meant when they were written, and what they have come to mean in relationship to antisemitism and anti-Jewish theology, and how they might be understood in ways that contribute to dismantling antisemitism and anti-Jewish theology in proclamation and teaching" [FN 8]; ...

A local inner-city church, Father's House, will run a two-week camp for the children in their community. As well, the Wounded Warriors agency runs a camp for children who are suffering from PTSD and the local Czechoslovakian Society runs a language camp.



Van Es Retreat House Renovations

It's definitely been an odyssey for the caretaker's house at Camp VanEs. The house was originally built in 1977 and has seen no major renovations since it was new. In July of 2019, the renters vacated the house & the decision was made by the Camp Board to convert it to a small retreat center.

A series of renovations have taken place recently, including replacing the shingle roof, building a new deck, installing new windows and a new front door, renovating the bathrooms, and more. Scan the QR code to view photos and read about these renovations in more detail.

The house needs new kitchen cabinets, counter tops and backsplash, bathroom vanities, sinks, toilets and tile work, new flooring throughout and new appliances (fridge, stove, dishwasher,

microwave & range hood). The attic in the house and garage need to be topped up with blow-in insulation. New hand railings are required for the back deck and the front doorsteps. Window coverings and new furnishings (beds, bedroom furniture, dining room table & chairs, couches, pictures, dishes, etc.) are also required.

Additional funds are required to take this project over the finish line. We need to raise an additional \$60K from the Moravian community to complete the house so that it can generate the revenue that Camp VanEs needs. Please consider donating to this project. 












Mt. Morris Service Camp with the Board of World Mission May 14-20, 2025


Western District Crossroads Lay Ministry Course Grants


